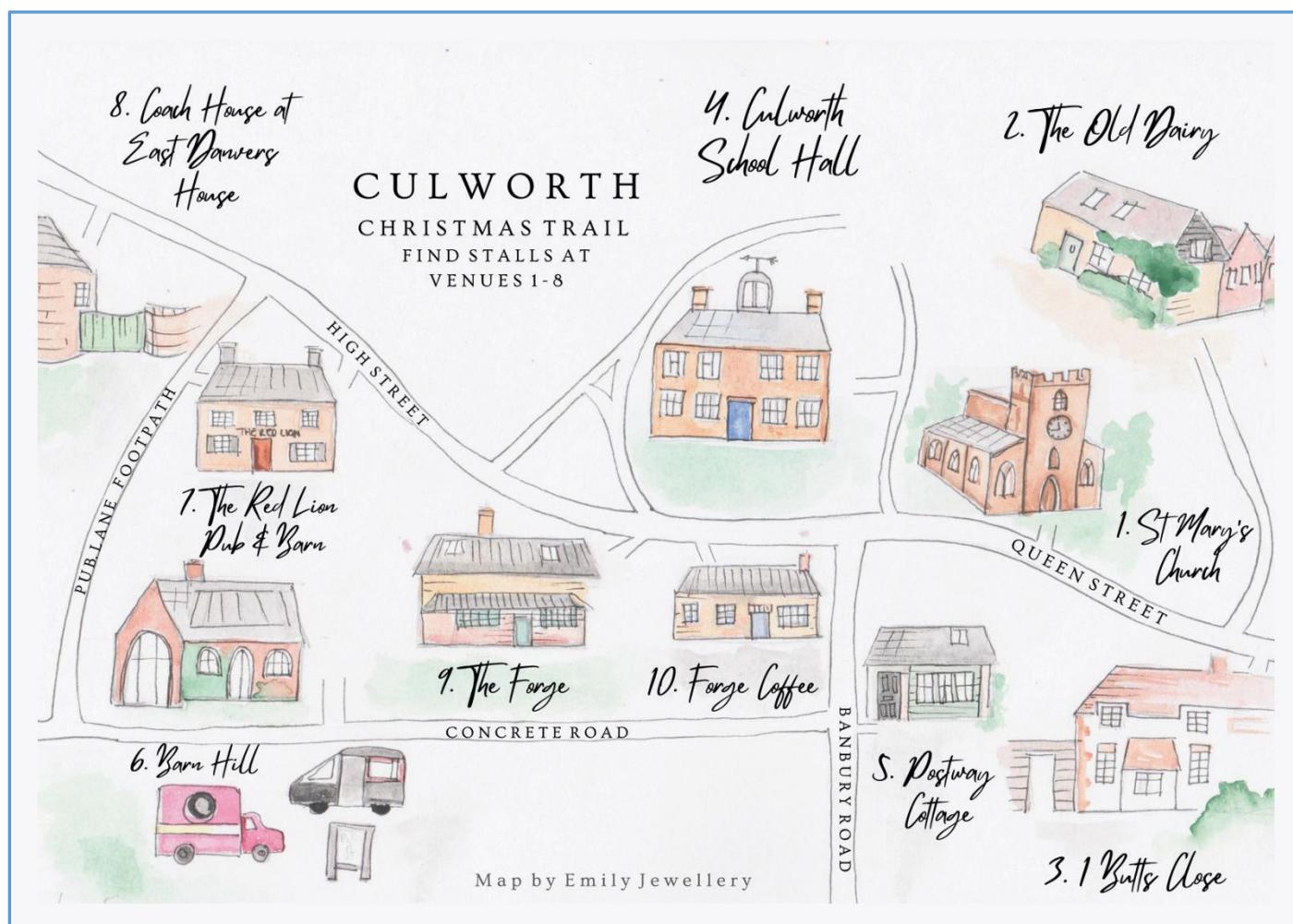

Remembrance Sunday

The sun glinted through the clouds. A large congregation numbering 55 adults and 11 children gathered in St Marys Church for the Annual Act of Remembrance at 10.15am. Gerald Cadogan led the service. Wreaths from the Royal British Legion, Culworth Church and Culworth Parish Council were laid on the altar by David Mold, June Oxley and Andrew Wilby.

Gerald's excellent address follows:

"When we meet every year in November to remember, and give thanks for, the men and women in uniform from this country and its allies, and in particular those from this village, who died in the two World Wars, as well as those who have died in other conflicts such as Korea or Afghanistan, we have much to thank God and them for. The 80 years since the end of the Second World War have been for Europe probably the longest time ever in two millennia or more to have been in general without wars: a remarkable feat, even if it is at present somewhat fragile. This long peace of the second half of the twentieth century has blessed us, and we are right to recall every year those who lost their lives to help achieve this.

But we need also to recall and honour the millions of civilians who suffered too, as a result, especially, of the relentless technological developments – I hesitate to say progress – that have made war a total experience by inflicting death and injury on millions of people not in uniform in many countries of the world. Ukraine, Gaza, Congo and Sudan come to mind at once. Near us, the blitz on Coventry 85 years ago this coming week is the same horrific story.

To remember before God the full experience in the Second World War of the people of this village, people who would have used this church and its churchyard, please have a look at the leather-bound book on the altar in the south aisle, the Lady Chapel which is itself a place of remembrance. This book fills out the story for Culworth and adds to the names in the tablets on the wall by the pulpit and the memories that belong with them, and deepens our understanding.

At the front the book is a Prayer Book; but bound in at the back are two lists. The longer one is of the people of Culworth in uniform, both deceased and survivors, recording what they did, and their unit and rank etc. The shorter list is of the civilians who were in the village Home Guard, including I think some too young to have joined up in the regular services. Have a look. You will find many familiar names.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them. Amen."

The Act of Remembrance continued at the War Memorial which has the roll of honour inscribed from the Two World Wars. Major Bradley Beresford of the Royal Engineers, in full military dress read out those names to over 70 people including 11 children. The two-minute silence followed. It was quite a poignant moment to see Major Beresford standing to attention alone by the Memorial. The wreaths were laid on the Memorial as a reminder to us all, of the horrors of War.

Our thanks go to Gerald Cadogan for leading both services, Jenny Howse for playing the organ, Simon Theobald for organising the wreaths, Basil and Trudy for their care of the War Memorial and especially to Major Bradley Beresford. It is a long time since Culworth had a serving member of His Majesty's armed forces.

John Russell Taylor - some of us remember John and his partner Yeung when they lived at Danvers House. Noted as the biographer for Alfred Hitchcock, he was also a film and art critic for The Times. He loved conversation and his dogs. It was a privilege to be entertained by John and Yeung. John died on August 18th aged 90. Yeung and he had many happy times together.

Jennifer Ormond - wife of John Ormond, died on November 3rd after a period of ill health. She had the most marvellous care both from her family and Spencer House. Jenny used to live in Wheatsheaf Cottages, teaching at Chipping Warden. Her talents abounded. She loved art and games. How many children were taught to swim by her? Not long ago one of her ex-pupils Tony Hinchcliffe had an exhibition of his art at Priors Hardwick. This talented artist credits his teaching at Chipping Warden school by Jenny, and also Jenny Howse as the encouragement for his art. Jenny loved cooking, flower arranging, gardening and more. She and John were very thoughtful and kind to their then neighbour Mrs Rigby. Jenny and John moved with Dan her grandson to Northampton, to enable Dan to have the best care and education for his multiple needs. Besides giving Dan most excellent loving care, Jenny taught him to paint too. We send much sympathy and love to John, her daughters Gail, Caroline, Callum and Sharon and her grandchildren especially Dan.

Richard Jones late of Paddocks Farm died on October 29th. He and his late wife Jane participated in village life with their three children Victoria, Harry and Fergus. They were fun loving. We remember them with affection and send our sympathy to Richard's children and grandchildren.

Simon Langdale – husband of Diana and father of Andrew, Phillipa and Mark and grandfather to Phoebe, Paddy, Kit, Felix, Olly and Rafe, died on Thursday 13th November. In his earlier days, he had been a master at Radley, Eastbourne, Tonbridge, and Headmaster of Shrewsbury School. He loved horseracing and playing golf. This quiet, very smart smiling gentleman gave wise counsel to many people locally about school, university and further education. He ran the sports day for the Golden Jubilee, encouraging children to take part. As an integral of the Culworth Church congregation he led services, mowed the churchyard, cleaned the church and much more. The Annual Summer garden party in the Langdales' immaculate garden was always a great pleasure to attend. Sadly, Parkinsons disease limited his much later life. Simon was good at cricket having coached many boys especially at Tonbridge, a school which has produced many Test and County Cricketers. Maybe one of his last achievements in the village was in the egg throwing competition at the Fete on the Cricket Field now Hill Field. He won the competition with Rupert Rowling. We all were so thrilled. Wonderfully cared for by Diana and his family, Simon spent only a very few weeks in a Nursing Home. He adored his family and they him. A thanksgiving service will be held in the New Year. We send much love and sympathy to Diana and her loving family.

Culworth over the last 100 years

How different was Culworth in 1925 compared with today?

100 years ago, there was no running water, mains sewage or electricity with villagers instead having to draw water from a well. There are a number still dotted around the village. Does your property have one? Here at The Forge, there are three. In the 1920s, earth closets would have been used rather than flush toilets with a night cart collecting the sewage to deposit it in a specified field. With no electricity or gas, central heating took the form of black lead ranges with an open fire where pots of water would be constantly on the boil. The heat of the ovens could be regulated by adjusting the intensity of the coal fire while paraffin stoves could both heat saucepans and heat the room, albeit creating much condensation in the process.

Washing involved the heating of the copper in the washhouse; this was a brick-built structure with space for a fire underneath to heat the water placed in the lead lined copper. The copper was filled the night before so that the first person up could lay and light the fire to heat the water. Twill sheets were washed first, then rinsed in the dolly tub in cold water and put through the mangle to ring the water out. Dirty work clothes were washed last. Washing was hung on the line with dolly pegs.

Many trades were in the village, with the current names of houses bearing testimony to that. Around the Green there is The Old Bakehouse, The Old Village Shop, The Old Post Office whilst The Forge was also a wheelwright's and carpenter's shop. Farms were aplenty with Fulford Farm, Westhill, Yeomans (which is now The Paddocks), Home Farm, Happylands, Culworth Grounds and Blackbird Hill. And as well as The Red Lion, which thankfully remains to this day, there were two further pubs, The Wheatsheaf and Rectory Villas.

There was even a train station, Culworth Halt, which was situated at the bottom of the hill near the turn to Eydon with the remains of the bridge still visible today, on the line from Banbury to Woodford Halse. (Confusingly Culworth Station was much nearer Moreton Pinkney). As well as a train service, the Carrier took people to Banbury on Thursday for Market day. There were very few cars.

There was no telephone, television or radio in general. One of the few buildings to still be as familiar to today's Culworth residents as it was to those of a century ago is Mumford's, the butchers. This fourth-generation family business is still in its original premises with four vans delivering to the surrounding villages, selling not only fresh meat (including the noted sausages) but greengrocery, fruit and basic grocery ingredients. They are the lifeline for many older people. During the pandemic, their diligence and hard work enabled many to get essential shopping to the door. Whatever village social event takes place in Culworth, it is likely that Mumford's will have generously supplied the sausages and burgers.

How lucky is Culworth to have the benefit of a shop open six days a week with the smiling faces of David and Sally, Carl, Chris and Max to serve us. Long may it continue.

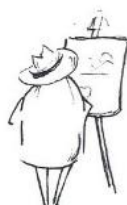
